



Burning *unitedstreaming*™ Video Clips on DVDs

Hardware

The most common formats used in consumer DVD (Digital Video Disc) production are DVD-R and DVD+R. A player or burner may support only one of these formats. For example, a DVD player may support only DVD-R discs, but a burner may only output DVD+R discs, making them incompatible.

Software

Most commercial burning software for DVD creation have the option to burn data DVDs in their demo or free trial software. The DVD-data option is for storing or archiving files only—this is not sufficient for burning video files for display using a set top DVD player.

For this, the full version of the software will be required. Follow all tutorials the software provides and use a rewritable DVD until comfortable with the process. Trial and error will probably be necessary to get the desired results.

If price is an issue, the VCD (Video Compact Disc) is a viable option. Most set top players support this format, but double check before choosing this option. The VCD format consists of DVD files burned to a conventional CD-R disc. The space on a CD is far less than a DVD, but it is a more cost effective way to present the *unitedstreaming* files on DVD player.

IMPORTANT: When adding *unitedstreaming* concept clips to a DVD or VCD project, the .asf extension must be manually changed to a .wmv extension.
